A Bold Step into the Future

Our vision is that family homelessness is brief and non-recurring. In July, we purchased A Journey Home campus, where we provide safe and healthy living spaces for families who are on a path to self-sufficiency. Every day, the families who seek shelter are actively creating a campus where the realization of goal setting and attainment is prioritized and the commitment to success is shared among all.

Housing insecurity is a complex problem. It won't yield to a simple solution. It requires an integrated approach that reaches beyond immediate needs. Family Promise of Gallatin Valley initiates coordinated efforts that bring communities together to help families experiencing homelessness regain their housing, their independence, and to achieve their goals.

Every year in America, over three million children experience homelessness. These children are eight/nine times more likely to repeat a grade, three times more likely to be placed in special education programs, and seven times more likely to attempt suicide. 42% will drop out of school at some point and 47% suffer from anxiety, depression, or withdrawal.



We have the privilege of working with dedicated, hard-working families - families who are fully invested in their future and the stability, care, and growth of their children, grandchildren, and siblings. We are proud to be a trusted support, empowering families with access, resources, and a future filled with sustainable independence and stability.

By 2025, Family Promise of Gallatin Valley will serve 500 more families.

Prevention and Diversion

Family Promise works with families to avoid the trauma of losing their housing and we are there when a family's homelessness is imminent.

Through our Prevention and Diversion programs, Family Promise provides temporary assistance needed to prevent moving into emergency shelter, to maintain or move into stable housing, including rental payment assistance, landlord mediation, and transportation and utility support.

For nearly six months, a family of five had been without any sustainable and safe shelter - car camping, sleeping in tents at Hyalite, and renting a hotel room around payday. This family recently had a baby which expedited their need to find stable housing. They worked with a Family Advocate and Prevention Specialist and implemented a plan for their housing search. Family Promise was able to provide funds for the security deposit and, within one month, they secured a place to call home.

Family Promise's Shelter Programs provides temporary shelter and highly individualized, person-centered, trauma-informed case management to move families from homelessness to housing independence.

We serve individuals who are pregnant, families with children under the age of 18, and families of all compositions. We provide immediate assistance for families at risk for being exposed to the outside elements.

98% are gainfully employed

45% paid off debt

72% saved money

28% received mental health services

92% received health care services

Stabilization

Our Stabilization Program provides continued support and reduces the risk of a family's re-entry into homelessness. By staying engaged with families as they exit the Prevention, Diversion, or Shelter Programs, we can limit the trauma experienced when losing a home.

Housing Stabilization also helps families navigate secondary traumas such as: financial strains, employment barriers, unstable mental health, and previous debts.




